Pastor's Note



Fr. Híggíns **POPE EMERITUS BENEDICT'S MESSAGE ON THE PRESENT DISTRESS OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH**

A few weeks ago *Klerusblatt*, a German clerical journal published an extended reflection by Pope Emeritus Benedict on the present condition of the Catholic Church which is, as we all know, reeling from moral scandals worldwide in scope.



The reflection did receive media attention, but it was largely (and falsely) framed as a Benedict vs. Francis faceoff.

The complete essay, translated into English for the National Catholic Register, is a very carefully balanced analysis of the immoral

behaviors in the context of the second-half of the 20th Century. I think it well worth reading for anyone who wants to try to understand the Church's internal problems at a deeper level.

What has received little to no attention. however, from the Pope Emeritus's reflection is the third and final part where, as he says, "I would like to develop some perspectives for a proper response on the part of the Church."

While it is not possible to do justice to Benedict's careful and subtle thinking in this confined space, I cite the following excerpts from Part III to give some idea of its content and in the hope that readers will be interested in seeking out the complete essay on their own.

What must be done? Perhaps we should create another Church for things to work out? Well, that experiment has already been undertaken

and has already failed. Only obedience and love for our Lord Jesus Christ can point the way. So let us try to understand anew and from within [ourselves] what the Lord wants, and has wanted within us. First. I would suggest the following: If we really wanted to summarize very briefly the content of the Faith as laid down in the Bible, we might do so by saying that the Lord has initiated a narrative of love with us and wants to subsume all creation in it. The counterforce against evil, which threatens us and the whole world, can ultimately only consist in our entering into this love. It is the real counterforce against evil. The power of evil arises from our refusal to love God. He who entrusts himself to the love of God is redeemed. Our being not redeemed is a consequence of our inability to love God. Learning to love God is therefore the path of human redemption...

It is very important to oppose the lies and halftruths of the devil with the whole truth: Yes, there is sin in the Church and evil. But even today there is the Holy Church, which is indestructible. Today there are many people who humbly believe, suffer and love, in whom the real God, the loving God, shows Himself to us. Today God also has His witnesses (martyres) in the world. We just have to be vigilant in order to see and hear them...Today's Church is more than ever a "Church of Martyrs" and thus a witness to the living God. If we look around and listen with an attentive heart, we can find witnesses everywhere today...who stand up for God with their life and suffering.

PARISH HISTORY

Parishioner Martha Phillips has discovered two news stories from the *Boston Globe*, reporting on Corpus Christ Processions for St. Mary's Parish (our original parish name), 1897-1898. Here follows account of the Corpus Christi Procession:

June 21st, 1897 EXERCISES LARGELY ATTENDED Corpus Christi Procession at St. Mary's Church, Newton Upper Falls

NEWTON, June 21—Corpus Christi exercises were carried out at St. Mary's Church, Upper Falls, yesterday afternoon in a very impressive manner. A Procession of the Blessed Sacrament under the direction of the rector, Rev. T.J. Danahy, marched from the main altar of the church through the splendid grounds around the sacred edifice to two other altars erected amid scenes of rare and sylvan beauty.

The body of the Procession was made up of appropriate and graceful features, among them being little boys typifying St. John the Baptist; Mr. Daniel Leahy attired as the goof King of Bohemia [Good King Wenceslaus], accompanied by his two pages, William Sullivan and John Arthur Kerrigan; "Faith, Hope and Charity", by Miss Maud Sullivan, Miss Katharine C. Sullivan and Miss Annie Daley, respectively; the various choirs of angels, represented by the children of the Sunday school and from the academy of the Assumption. St. Mary's Sodality also participated, and immediately following the priests were the sisters from the convent. The music for the occasion was furnished by three choirs, those of St. Mary's, St. Joseph's [Needham], and Assumption academy. *(continued on page 7...)*

COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN MISSAL

 f or this week's examination of the Collects of the Roman Missal, we turn to the Prayer over the Offerings (Super Oblata or Secreta) for today's Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. The Latin text is very similar in both forms of the Roman Rite. The following is the 2010 ICEL translation of this prayer in the MR'70:

"Sanctify by the invocation of Your name, we pray, O Lord our God, this oblation of our service, and by it make of us an eternal offering to You. Through Christ our Lord. Amen."

This brief prayer consists of two brief petitions which appear to have a causal relationship. The priest begs God to make our sacrificial gifts of bread and wine holy by means of his calling upon them the Divine Name (i.e., his calling upon the Three Persons of the Trinity). Consequently, the sanctified gifts will make us into a sacrificial offering. In other words, each of the Persons works in concert to bring about a transformation in the gifts and in us. What is the connection between God's Triune Name and the sanctification of the gifts and subsequently, of us, as well?

We certainly associate the explicit naming of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit with the rite of Baptism. God both changes and indwells the souls of the baptized. We sometimes forget, however, the importance of the invocation of *all three Persons of the Trinity* in the rites of the Mass. From a technical standpoint in Latin theology, the words of Christ Himself effect the change of bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ. At the same time, the Church without question relies upon the action of *all three Persons of the Trinity* in effecting the Eucharistic Sacrifice, and invokes them explicitly or, at times, even implicitly. In view of this, consider the following from *Catechism of the Catholic Church* nos. 259:

"Being a work at once common and personal, the whole divine economy makes known both what is proper to the Divine Persons, and their one divine nature. Hence the whole Christian life is a communion with each of the Divine Persons, without in any way separating them. Everyone who glorifies the Father does so through the Son in the Holy Spirit; everyone who follows Christ does so because the Father draws him and the Spirit moves him."

Thus, in regard to the divine work of Sacred Liturgy in particular, it is not simply a matter of reducing everything to the words of consecration alone, even if they are the *sine qua non* of the Mass. The totality of the action is Trinitarian, encompassing the whole of the Eucharistic Prayer itself.

What about the invocation of God's name and *our* transformation into "*an eternal offering*"? This is meant to remind us of Baptism, and more especially of the *character* of Baptism, which is directed toward offering fitting worship to God. I regularly refer to *Catechism* no. 1273 in this weekly column, and I believe that it bears repeating, because it gets to the heart of what it means to be a baptized Christian:

"Incorporated into the Church by Baptism, the faithful have received the sacramental character that consecrates them for Christian religious worship. The baptismal seal enables and commits Christians to serve God by a vital participation in the holy liturgy of the Church and to exercise their baptismal priesthood by the witness of holy lives and practical charity."

God's Name was invoked upon us at Baptism to enable us to worship Him through, with, and in Christ. So too, at Mass, we ask to be more deeply rooted in the gift of our baptismal character, so that we can know and adore God more worthily both now and into eternity. This is what it means to be an *eternal* offering. And note, too, that "offering" here (continued on page 7....)

singular, not plural. The character of Baptism is unitive, because it forms us individual Christians into the one Body of Christ, which is the Church (Catechism nos. 775, 787-96). Baptismal character directs her towards the Trinity in a single and eternal act of adoration which is Christ's Sacrifice (Catechism nos. 784, 1089).

The officiating clergymen were Rev. Thomas A. Walsh of St. Patrick's church, Roxbury, assisted by Rev. Cornelius Riordan of St. Mary's, and Rev. Matthew J. Flaherty of St. Peter's, Cambridge. A guard of honor carrying the canopy consisted of Messrs. Thomas J. Sullivan, Mark V. Crocker, Andrew Hughes, and William Hopkins.

In the work of directing various features of the Procession Mr. Augustus Cahill, Mr. John Smith, and Mr. Durbin acted as aids. The altar boys made a very fine appearance, and were led off by Master Richard T. Sullivan. The people of the congregation, together with many from other places, joined in the exercises and the whole spectacle was one of edifying religious fervor. Mr. Phillip J. Doherty was among the distinguished visitors from Boston. His children, who are pupils at the Wellesley academy, took a leading part in the ceremonies.

The sisters of charity, who have charge of the Sunday school children of St. Mary's, are a particularly accomplished teaching order. They have established the magnificent academy of the Assumption at Wellesley Hills where every facility for a most excellent education is accorded to children of all ages.


