

# **Pastor's Note**

## MISSION APPEAL TODAY FOR THE DIOCESE OF FORT PORTAL, UGANDA

**C**oday we welcome Fr. Robert Byamukama to our parish of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes to make a Mission Appeal on behalf of his diocese of Fort Portal, Uganda. This is the annual visit of a missionary assigned to us by the Archdiocesan Missionary Co-operative Appeal. The bishop of Fort Portal, His Excellency Robert Muhiirwa, has sent ahead a letter of introduction for his missionary preachers, from which I quote:

#### Greetings Dear Friends:

I greet you in the Name of Our Lord! I wish to make a small write-up highlighting the need for the mission appeals in the different places in Boston.

Among the many pressing needs that our Diocese faces, the Diocese has chosen to give priority this year to the **Construction of the Retirement House for the elderly and sick priests in Fort Portal Diocese.** The Diocese finds it expensive to treat our priests and take care of them from different places. Having them in one place, which has a quick access to the hospital is our ideal, a reason why we have undertaken this project. Therefore, with little resource available for this project I request you people of goodwill to help and enable us with your support to care for our priests who have served the Church faithfully and diligently.

The opportunity for mission appeals for our diocese is of paramount importance. Through this co-operation we are helped to implement projects which, by our own effort, we are unable to complete. The majority of the Christians in Fort Portal Diocese are peasants whose incomes are very low, living under a dollar a day. This makes it very hard for them to support the diocesan projects. Our economy itself is unable to sustain the operations of the Church and its needs.

This project is phased given the enormous costs it involves. The first phase of the structure comprises an L-shaped house whose main components are 10 bedrooms, a chapel, and a dining room. We started off by constructing a slab for the entire house which successfully has been completed at a cost of UGX 210,000,000, the equivalent of US \$58,333. This is by the efforts of the priests in the diocese and a few well-wishers who have contributed to this project.

Besides this, there are other challenges: the payment of seminarians' tuition for their training, priests' Health Insurance, the big challenge of refugees who come from the neighboring countries as the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), Rwanda, and South Sudan because of wars, and the many orphans (most of whom are of school-going age) whose parents have died because of wars and diseases like HIV/AIDS, and the cost of running three orphanage homes among others.

Through mission appeals we are able to meet some of these pressing needs that surround us. For this year, however, our main focus is on the construction of the house for the sick and elderly priests. We shall be very grateful to receive your generous support. Thank you.

## COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN MISSAL



David Allen PRECIOUS BLOOD PRAYER OVER THE OFFERINGS Missale Romanum 1970(MR '70)

"As we offer our oblation to Your majesty, O Lord, may we draw near in these mysteries to Jesus, the Mediator of the New Covenant, and celebrate anew the sprinkling of His Blood, in which lies all our salvation. Through Christ our Lord. Amen."

This beautiful prayer explicitly draws upon three particular passages from the Letter to the Hebrews:

A) "But you have come.....to Jesus, the <u>mediator of a</u> <u>new covenant</u>, and to the <u>sprinkled blood</u> that speaks more graciously than the blood of Abel" (Heb. 12:22-24, RSV).

B) "Therefore, brethren, since we have confidence to enter the sanctuary by the <u>blood of Jesus</u>, by the new and living way which He opened for us through the curtain, that is, through His flesh, and since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us <u>draw near</u> with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with <u>our hearts sprinkled clean</u> from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water." (Heb. 10:19-22, RSV).

*C*) "Let us then with confidence <u>draw near</u> to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need" (Heb. 4:16, RSV).

St. Paul (regarded by many of the Fathers as the author of Hebrews), speaks eloquently in this letter about the efficacy of Christ's shed Blood in making satisfaction for human sins, and reconciling man with God. The reference to "sprinkling" in the first passage above is the solemn "Day of Atonement" in which the Levitical High Priest entered the "Holy of Holies" once each year in the Tabernacle, and sprinkled the blood from the sacrificial animal onto the "mercy seat," that is, the lid covering the Ark of the Covenant. Jesus fulfills the symbolic meaning of this rite by making efficacious atonement, as St. Paul shows us in Hebrews 9 (and commentators stress this point, too):

"But when Christ appeared as a high priest of the good things that have come, then through the greater and more perfect tent (not made with hands, that is, not of this creation) He entered once for all into the Holy Place, taking not the blood of goats and calves but <u>His own blood</u>, thus securing an eternal redemption [note here the inherent link between the Cross and the Ascension]. For if the <u>sprinkling</u> of defiled persons with the blood of goats and bulls and with the ashes of a heifer sanctifies for the purification of the flesh, how much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered Himself without blemish to God, purify your conscience from dead works to serve the living God" (Heb. 9:11 -14, RSV).

Thus, our Prayer over the Offerings, relying upon these passages above, reflects a solemn and joyful anticipation of this reality: the efficacious re-presentation of Christ's Sacrifice in the Eucharistic Prayer, with all its accompanying benefits for the Church and the world.

I would also like to reiterate the importance of baptismal character (as I often like to do) in light of v. 14 in this above-quoted passage from Heb. 9 (the commentary of the Ignatius Study Bible also alludes to this point in its treatment of Heb. 10:22). In Baptism, Christ's Blood "*purif[ies] our conscience[s] from dead works*," and this purification is ordered towards "serv[ing] the living God." The New American Bible even more accurately renders this latter verb as "to worship the living God." This is baptismal character! (continued on page 6....)

The Blood of Christ poured on our souls in Baptism effectively purifies us from sin and equips us for divine worship (cf. *Catechism of the Catholic Church* nos. 1272-4).



## LATIN MASS PROPERS: SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

**INTROIT: Psalm 27: 8-9** The Lord is the strength of His people, and the protector of the salvation of His anointed: save, O Lord, Thy people, and bless Thy inheritance, and rule them for ever. *Psalm 27: 8-9* Unto Thee will I cry, O Lord: O my God, be not Thou silent to me, lest if Thou be silent to me, I become like them that go down into the pit. *V.* Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT O God of all power and might, who art the giver of all good things; implant in our hearts the love of Thy name, increase in us true religion, nourish us with all goodness and by Thy mercy keep us in the same. Through our Lord.

**EPISTLE: Romans 6: 3-11** Brethren, all we who are baptized in Christ Jesus are baptized in His death. For we are buried together with Him by baptism unto death; that as Christ is risen from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we also may walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of His death, we shall also be in the likeness of His resurrection. Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with Him, that the body of sin may be destroyed, and that we may serve sin no longer. For he that is dead is justified from sin. Now if ye be dead with Christ, we believe that we shall live also together with Christ. Knowing that Christ, rising again from the dead, dieth now no more, death shall no more have dominion over Him. For in that He died to sin He died once; but in that He liveth, He liveth unto God. So do you also reckon yourselves to be dead indeed to sin.

**GRADUAL:** Psalm 89: 13, 1 Return, O Lord, a little; and be entreated in favour of Thy servants. *V*. Lord, Thou hast been our refuge from generation to generation. **ALLELUIA:** Psalm 30: 2-3 Alleluia, alleluia. *V*. In Thee, O Lord, have I hoped, let me never be confounded: deliver me in Thy justice, and release me; bow down Thy ear to me, make haste to deliver me. Alleluia.

GOSPEL: Mark 8: 1-9 **A**t that time, when there was a great multitude with Jesus, and had nothing to eat, calling His disciples together, He saith to them: I have compassion on the multitude, for behold they have now been with Me three days, and have nothing to eat; and if I shall send them away fasting to their home, they will faint in the way: for some of them came from afar off. And His disciples answered Him: From whence can any one fill them here with bread in the wilderness? And He asked them: How many loaves have ye? Who said: Seven. And He commanded the people to sit down on the ground. And taking the seven loaves, giving thanks, He broke and gave to His disciples to set before the people. And they had a few little fishes, and He blessed them, and commanded them to be set before them. And they did eat, and were filled; and they took up that which was left of the fragments, seven baskets: and they that had eaten were about four thousand: and He sent them away.



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
