# Fr. Higgins

## **OCTOBER, THE MONTH OF "RESPECT-**FOR-HUMAN-LIFE"

**W**hile the Rosary holds the pride of place for devotion during this

Month of October the theme of "Respect-for-Human-Life" is given prominence for its urgency in the moral and social realm. The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) gives the Church's teaching on the sacredness and dignity of all human life in Article 5 of its section on the Second Great Precept of Charity, "Thou Shalt Love Thy Neighbor as Thyself", the Fifth Commandment— "Thou shalt not kill."

The Catechism lays out the basis for the Church's moral positions in the following way:

"Human life is sacred because from its beginning it involves the creative action of God and it remains forever in a special relationship with the Creator, who is its sole end. God alone is the Lord of life from its beginning until its end: no-one can under any circumstance claim for himself the right to directly destroy an innocent human being." (PAR 2258)

These words are worth reading and re-reading in order for us to have great clarity of mind about the principle which undergirds the whole of the Church's moral claims about what may and may not be done regarding our human life. We want to make sure that we are not reacting based upon how strongly we feel about something, one way or the other. Strong feeling, untethered from sound and reasonable moral principle, can just as easily lead us to into error as well as truth. Our Catholic Church does indeed have a sound and reasonable moral principle out of which she is drawing her various conclusions on the right and wrong of things like abortion or euthanasia.

The Catechism's Article 5 divides the presentation of the "Life Issues" into three sections: I. Respect for Human Life, II. Respect for the Dignity of Persons, III. Safeguarding Peace.

Respect for Human Life explains the wrongfulness of, first of all, intentional *homicide (wilful murder)*. It then goes on to specifically critique other forms of killing: abortion, euthanasia, and suicide. In any discussion we might have with someone who is not convinced that legal protection of the rightto-life of the unborn is "anybody else's business" it is crucial that we ourselves have a correct understanding of the Church's teaching here and that we be able to lay it out in an eventempered and respectful way.

Respect for the Dignity of Persons addresses the sins of scandal, temperance and intemperance of the body, and other ways in which the dignity of persons may be violated.

Safequarding peace treats of the duty we have to preserve peace and to avoid war. Indeed, the first murder of Abel by his brother Cain reaches it's apogee in the mass-murder which occurs during war-fare.

Insofar as men are sinners, the threat of war hangs over them and will so continue until Christ comes again; but insofar as they can vanguish sin by coming together in charity, violence itself will be vanquished and these words will be fulfilled: "they shall beat their swords into ploughshares...neither shall they learn war any more." (PAR 2317)

# Davíd Allen ST. JOHN HENRY NEWMAN

**T**oday marks the canonization of John Henry Cardinal Newman, a preeminently influential thinker, preacher, writer, and

convert in the nineteenth century. The following is the Collect for his feast, as found in the CTS hand missal for the Catholic dioceses of England and Wales:

"O God, who bestowed on the Priest Blessed John Henry Newman the grace to follow Your kindly light and find peace in Your Church, graciously grant that through his intercession and example we may be led out of shadows and images into the fullness of Your truth. Through our Lord, etc. Amen."

This Collect's ascription clause quotes Newman's classic hymn "Lead Kindly Light," which he wrote as young Anglican priest on a sea voyage from Italy back to England. Having recovered from a serious illness, he appeals to God's benevolent providence with a newfound sense of humility and reliance upon His sovereignty.

Like Newman, we too must grow in humility, and seek to conform our lives to God's program for us, relying fully upon His transcendent love in all things (cf. Rom. 8). The ideal Christian posture toward God is always the child-like faith Christ proposes to us at various points in the Gospel (cf. Mt. 6:25-34, 11:25-30, 18:1-4). Likewise, we must have the humility to recognize our ongoing need for conversion of mind and heart. Newman experienced this acutely as his efforts to catholicize the Church of England eventually led him to a profound re-evaluation of his "Anglican difficulties" with the Roman Church. This was quite a humbling experience for him.

Many Catholics today of various ideological stripes might also consider how their religious and political beliefs line up with the teaching of the Church (this, of course, presumes that one first learn what that teaching really is). The humility that can often come from such an *examen* can be immensely fruitful, just as it was for Newman. It can lead to a greater realization of the true immensity and power of the Church's faith, which utterly transcends our intellectual limitations and ideological distortions. When divine truth pulverizes our idols, grace expands our minds and hearts to adore God more genuinely and humbly, while simultaneously enkindling within us an increased charity for our neighbor.

The Collect's petition references the epitaph on Newman's gravestone: "out of shadows and images into the truth." This Platonic phrase echoes the teaching of St. Paul in his comparison of our knowledge of God in this life vs. our knowledge of Him in eternity: "For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall understand fully, even as I have been fully understood" (1 Cor. 13:12, RSV).

Newman had an intense passion for the truth, as is evidenced in his life-long study of Christian doctrine. His remarkably penetrating grasp of the faith should prompt us to grow more deeply in our understanding of the faith. If we want to be ready to face the blinding radiance of God's face at the moment of death- an awesome and sobering truththen our growth in charity (the *sine qua non* for entrance into heaven) also rightly demands a concomitant growth in our *knowledge* of God as *He* wants to be known (i.e., in the Church via Scripture and Tradition).

Too often today, we find a relativistic posture toward faith which may be characterized as the "anything goes" approach, which typically finds its foundation *apart* from revealed doctrine. Such a liberalized notion of faith finds its intellectual roots in liberal Protestant religious thought of the nineteenth century. This was a pernicious and corrosive trend *(continued on page 6...)*

against which Newman fought with great zeal, both as an Anglican and as a Catholic. The good news the Church proposes, however, is that doctrine matters, for Jesus Christ is the fullness of both truth and love, as St. John tells us in the Prologue of his Gospel (cf. In. 1:14).



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# LATIN MASS PROPERS: EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

**EPISTLE:** From the Letter of Blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians, I. 4-8. Brethren: I give thanks to my God always for you, for the grace of God that is given you in Jesus Christ, that in all things you are made rich in Him in all utterance and in all knowledge, as the testimony of Christ was confirmed in you; so that nothing is wanting to you in any grace, waiting for the manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ. Who also will confirm you unto the end without crime, in the day of the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.
