MARY IMMACULATE **OF LOURDES: 109th** ANNIVERSARY OF THE **CHURCH DEDICATION** NOVEMBER 24th, 1910 (THANKSGIVING DAY)

The front-cover for this week's Parish Sunday Bulletin shows two historic photographs of our parish church as it looked at its Dedication on November 24th, 1910 A.D. The Day of Dedication that year was also Thanksgiving Day and so it is fitting for us each year to celebrate our Anniversary on the Thanksgiving Day Holiday as we will do this coming Thursday at the special 9 AM Mass.

The interior of the church is an example of the style of what was called the "decorated church". The whole interior of the church was the artist's palette, the portrait paintings being only a portion of this larger art-work. As you can see from the old photographs, the portraits were surrounded by all kinds of decorative painting which have since been painted over by later (and unfortunate) renovations from the 1960s on. The careful removal of these overlays and the restoration of the original decorative artwork remains a goal for us, although it has to wait until we are first able to support our yearly operating expenses.

Over the course of the past month I have preached at Sunday Mass on the challenges of parish stewardship and the duty of the layfaithful to fulfill the Fifth (of the Six) Precept of the Church, which is:

The Fifth Precept of the Church obliges the faithful to support their Church. It is an obligation of justice to provide for the needs of God's ministers, and, hence, in itself a grave obligation. The faithful have the duty to contribute, according to their means, to the

support of their pastors, their church and school. They have, like-wise, the obligation of charity to support their home and foreign missions, Catholic Charities, orphanages, etc.

The Fifth Precept of the Church concerns both rich and poor (who can often render personal service), young and old. While their obligation is a grave one, we would not condemn anyone of grave sin who neglects to contribute his share, unless the clergy would thereby suffer want or other parishioners be greatly overburdened. Entrance into the church during divine worship must be absolutely free, and a parishioner has a right to the consolations of religion when dying regardless of past neglect in supporting his church.

As I spoke about in my stewardship homily I am not asking anyone to give money you do not have. I am, however, and without any hesitation whatsoever, asking you to give the Lord His portion out of what you do have. The Biblical tithe, 10% of one's goods, given back to God for the things of God (and these as "first fruits") is the "gold-standard" for stewardship-level giving. I have suggested calculating your own personal tithe-number (10% of your income after-taxes) and comparing that to what you are actually giving as your church-support now. If this sum is lower than your calculated personaltithe number, then honestly try to move it up in the direction of the "Lord's portion".

COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN MISSAL



David Allen CHRIST THE KING (Missale Romanum 1970)

In the new calendar, the Feast of Christ the King emphasizes especially Our Lord's *cosmic* rule as "King of All," or *Pantokrator* in Greek (a popular iconographic theme in the domes of Byzantine Churches). As we end one liturgical year and move quickly into the next with the season of Advent, we are conscious today that Christ's coming at Christmas is not the only coming of His we anticipate. We expect His imminent coming as Judge of the living and the dead, as we profess in the Creed.

In the praying of the Liturgy of the Hours this particular week, the liturgical prescriptions recommend the use of the traditional Sequence hymn *Dies Irae*, originally found in the Requiem Mass. This hymn conveys great truths that we do well to consider this month of November, since it movingly describes the Day of Judgment. Here follow the fifth and eighth verses with my commentary. The following English translation is taken from the *Parish Book of Chant*.

"The written book shall be brought forth, containing all for which the world must be judged."

We do well to remember Our Lord's words, as St. Gregory the Great reminds us in one of his homilies: "I tell you, on the day of judgment men will render account for every careless word they utter" (Mt. 12:36, RSV). How much build-up of venial sin in this area there often is from day to day! Let us take our careless words and actions to the Lord in repentance. Let us take responsibility for the ways we ourselves may cause "death by a thousand cuts" to other people around us through thoughtless and hurtful speech and behavior.

Since God is omnipotent and all-benevolent, He will not allow the distorting effects of our forgiven sins to have any indefinite hold on us whatsoever- *and this is a good and most wholesome thing*! God wants us to be purified by the warmth of His grace of all things that are contrary to His gift of charity (love for Him and neighbor), so that we can shine in splendor like Our Lady. Before the majesty of Christ the King, our deepened contrition and more fervent acts of penance open us up to God's healing work, as we hear expressed in the following verse.




"O King of awful majesty, who of Thy free gift savest them that are to be saved, save me, O Fount of Mercy."

In the Byzantine Divine Liturgy, the priest exhorts the people in one of the litanies to pray for the following: "...and for a good defense before the awesome judgement seat of Christ, let us ask of the the Lord." This petition agrees with what we find in the Dies Irae. In what does such a "good defense" consist? Faith, love, and repentance, as expressed above: "save me, O Fount of Mercy."

The notable Baptist preacher Charles Stanley, in one of his recorded sermons, speaks convincingly about God's presence in the following way (my rough

recall of his words): "If God were to step into the room right now, we would be on our faces on the floor so fast, we wouldn't know what happened." This is indeed true. In the Blessed Sacrament, Jesus hides the overwhelming power of His divinity, just as He did throughout His time on earth (except for the Transfiguration). When we see the face of Christ *Pantokrator*, however, we will have only one thing to utter before such blindingly awesome holiness, truth, beauty, and goodness: "save me!" At the same time, however, the *Pantokrator* is also the *Philanthropos*, the "Lover of Mankind," who loves us more than we can ever comprehend. Hence we say, in faith and love, "O Fount of Mercy!"

For as lightning cometh out of the east, and appeareth even into the west, so shall also the coming of the Son of man be. Wheresoever the body shall be, there shall the eagles also be gathered together. And immediately after the tribulation of those days, the sun shall be darkened, and the moon shall not give her light, and the stars shall fall from heaven, and the powers of heaven shall be moved; and then shall appear the sign of the Son of man in heaven, and then shall all the tribes of the earth mourn; and they shall see the Son of man coming in the clouds of heaven with much power and majesty. And He shall send His angels with a trumpet and a loud voice, and they shall gather together His elect from the four winds, from the farthest parts of the heavens to the utmost bounds of them. And from the fig-tree learn a parable: when the branch thereof is now tender, and the leaves come forth, you know that summer is nigh. So you also, when you shall see all these things, know ye that it is nigh even at the doors. Amen I say to you that this generation shall not pass till all these things be done.
