THE SEASON OF FASTING

Forty Days of Lent. The Church recommends for all of us a more intensified practice of three things during Lent: **Prayer**, **Fasting**, **and Almsgiving**.

Let us consider what is meant by **Fasting.** To "fast" is to abstain from food. Church law gives it boundaries which fall within the space of eating sparingly and abstaining from some foods. Thus the obligatory fast days of Ash Wednesday and Good Friday oblige us to restrict ourselves to only one full meat-less meal with two smaller meat-less meals permitted in order to maintain strength. In former times the law of fasting was more severe than it is nowadays. This, however, does not mean that fasting is unimportant for our Christian life. Quite the contrary! As St. Augustine says: "Upon mature consideration I find in the Gospels and in the Apostolic Letters that fasting is a commandment."

If the Church law has minimized the number of obligatory days of fast it is so that the individual faithful might have more flexibility to practice reasonable fasting according to their circumstances and condition.

Note the emphasis on *reasonable fasting*. We are to be on guard against the possible abuses.

For example, we should not attempt **extreme fasting**. This occurs when a person drastically restricts calorie-intake or goes days at a time without eating or deliberately becomes malnourished by eating too few kinds of food. It is presumptuous to extract from the 40-day fast of Christ or the fasts we read about in the Lives of the Saints and say: *"I can do that too!"*

Another possible abuse is **bust-andbinge fasting.** This happens when a person will go for an entire day without eating anything, and then—that night or on the next day binge eat. This is not fasting. This is

another form of gluttony and a good way to give yourself a food hang-over.

Yet another possible abuse is **vanity fasting.** This is fasting with a worldly spirit. Fasting does have a certain caché in the spirit of the world which has little to do with what should be our motivation as Christians.

We eat sparingly and abstain from some foods during Lent in order to allow God to "curb our vices, lift up our minds, give us strength and reward." (Preface for Lent) We fast to atone for past sins. We fast to show our love for Christ our suffering Savior. "Fasting is truly a great blessing," says St. John Chrysostom, "And such a shield against Satan!"



CATECHESIS: ON-GOING INSTRUCTION IN THE FULLNESS OF CHRISTIAN FAITH

The LOURDES CATECHISM



<u>February 14th, 1858: The Second Apparition</u> <u>Shrove Sunday</u>

Our Lady has no other office but to bring men's souls to Jesus Christ and to direct them into the Mystery of the Cross. We can see how fatuous it is then to try to separate the "Marian dimension" of faith from sound Christology, as, for example, people may do by saying that Mary represents the "feminine side" of religion, or the "soft-side", the "emotional feel-good" as against the "harsh" dogmatic official Christianity of the Church.

In the history of Lourdes it is sometimes proposed that the Virgin Mary's appearance represents the "people's religion" whereas the orthodox teaching and interpretation is a clerical power grab on the part of bishops and priests. They are said to "impose" orthodoxy on an undefinable psycho-spiritual event.

This is hardly the case. At Lourdes we see Mary acting as a most orthodox catechist. Let us consider further the character of the first two Apparitions of the 18. Bernadette received two Apparitions before Ash Wednesday there in the grotto of the Massabielle: on February 11th (Shrove Thursday) and on February 14th (Shrove Sunday). In both of these Apparitions the beautiful young girl spoke no word.

We do well to recognize the elements here which frame the scene of the manger-cave at Bethlehem. 1) Bernadette testified that she saw a "a girl in white, no bigger than myself." Bernadette was just 14 and small for her age. At the Annunciation to Mary by the Angel Gabriel it is assumed that Mary was of the typical marriageable age for that time and place, which was 14-15 years old. This suggests Bernadette was seeing Mary at the age of the Annunciation, when, by her consent, "the Word was made flesh" in her virginal womb by the power of the Holy Spirit. 2) The Massabielle, a place where pigs had roamed, was a dark, forbidding, poor and dirty place. So also was the cave at Bethlehem which had the manger for animals to feed. 3) Bernadette was from an impoverished family, looked down upon socially by her "betters" at Lourdes. At Christ's Birth it was the poor shepherds who were directed by the Angel to find Jesus and Mary at the Bethlehem cave. 4) At His Nativity, Christ is a helpless Child, but faith tells us that He was already full of consciousness and pleading, meriting, and interceding for the human race He had come to save. The veil of the Holy Eucharist most closely approximates the silence of Christ's Infancy where His activity is unperceived by any human senses. On Shrove Sunday, on the day of the Second Apparition, the custom of the Forty Hours Eucharistic Devotion was going on at Lourdes in reparation for the excesses of Carnival. These first two Apparitions to Bernadette then represent two tableaux of the Mystery of the Incarnation which lays the foundation for the Mystery of the Redemption to come.

Jesus said to him: It is written again: Thou shalt not tempt the Lord Thy God. Again the devil took Him up into a very high mountain and showed Him all the kingdoms of the world and the glory of them, and said to Him: All these will I give Thee, if falling down Thou wilt adore me. Then Jesus saith to him: Be gone, Satan! For it is written: The Lord thy God shalt thou adore, and Him only shalt thou serve. Then the devil left Him: and behold angels came, and ministered to Him.

LENTEN REGULATIONS

CURRENT DISCIPLINE Days of Abstinence Begins on one's 14th birthday. Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent. Obliges abstention from flesh meat.

Days of Penance Applies to all the Faithful. Lent and Fridays outside of Lent.

Days of Fast Everyone aged 18-59. 1 full meal permitted, two other meals may be taken which, when combined, are less than a full meal. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

(The obligation to do penance is lifted on Fridays which are also celebrated as a solemnity: e.g., Christmas Day).

OLDER DISCIPLINE Days of Abstinence Applies on one's 7th birthday. **Complete Abstinence on** all Fridays of the year, Ash Wednesday, and the Vigil of Christmas. Partial Abstinence (meat and soup, or gravy made from meat permitted once a day at principal meal) weekdays of Lent, Ember Days of Wednesday & Saturday, Vigils of Pentecost & Assumption. (Abstinence dispensed on Holy Days of Obligation.)

Days of Fast Everyone aged 21-59. Days of Lent from Ash Wednesday on, Ember Days, Vigils of Christmas, Pentecost and the Assumption. One full meal permitted, with 2 smaller meals.
